Harm Reduction Grant Program

Application Due Date: February 7, 2022

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) is now accepting applications for the first-ever **SAMHSA Harm Reduction grant program** and expects to issue \$30 million in grant awards. This funding, authorized by the American Rescue Plan, will help increase access to a range of community harm reduction services and support harm reduction service providers as they work to help prevent overdose deaths and reduce health risks often associated with drug use. SAMHSA will accept applications from State, local, Tribal, and territorial governments, Tribal organizations, non-profit community-based organizations, and primary and behavioral health organizations.

This funding opportunity will provide support to those working in their communities to reduce the harms of drug use. Providing funding and support for innovative harm reduction services is a key pillar for the first time in the multi-faceted Health and Human Services' overdose prevention strategy announced in October. This funding allows organizations to expand their community-based overdose prevention programs in a variety of ways, including distributing overdose-reversal medications and fentanyl test strips, providing overdose education and counseling, and managing or expanding syringe services programs, which help control the spread of infectious diseases like HIV and hepatitis C.

Kentucky Injury Prevention and Research Center's (KIPRC) Report on Kentucky Resident Inpatient Hospitalizations for Nonfatal Drug Overdoses, 2016-2020

This report presents the burden of inpatient hospitalizations due to nonfatal drug overdoses among Kentucky residents from 2016 -2020.

Significant findings include:

- The number of statewide inpatient hospitalizations for all nonfatal drug overdoses in Kentucky in 2020 was approximately equal to the number in 2019. The number of hospitalizations for a stimulant overdose decreased slightly from 2019 to 2020, while the number of hospitalizations for an opioid overdose increased over that same period.
- The number of nonfatal drug overdose ED visits involving synthetic opioids increased in 2020 by 26.4%. Admissions for nonfatal drug overdoses involving heroin also increased from 2019 to 2020, though the percent increase (19.5%) was not as high as that for synthetic opioids. Annual admissions for nonfatal drug overdoses involving other drug types either decreased or remained approximately equal from 2019 to 2020.
- In 2020, the five Kentucky counties with the highest age-adjusted rates for nonfatal drug overdoses were Anderson, Kenton, Mercer, Carter, and McCreary.

Kentucky Statewide Addiction Stigma Reduction Campaign

The Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE), in partnership with Shatterproof—a national nonprofit dedicated to ending the addiction crisis in the United States—is implementing a 15-month evidence-based addiction stigma reduction campaign throughout the state of Kentucky. The National Stigma Initiative at Shatterproof uses research-based practices to work alongside state government and community organizations to eliminate the stigma and discrimination faced by those with opioid use disorders (OUD). Despite decades of action from nonprofits, healthcare providers, those with lived experience, and government agencies, **stigma remains one of the largest and most persistent drivers of negative outcomes for those struggling with addiction.**


This evidence-based approach to statewide stigma reduction is unique in that it:

- 1. Strengthens the capacity of community-based organization (CBOs) via monthly webinars;
- 2. Leverages CBOs as a trusted channel to disseminate evidence-based campaign collateral;
- 3. Educates the public using stories of recovery from individuals in their community; and
- 4. Evaluates the public health campaign at the beginning and end of the intervention.

Community-Based Organizations' Role in Kentucky's Stigma Reduction Campaign

Recruiting and actively engaging community-based organizations (CBOs) to disseminate campaign messaging around OUD is essential to changing knowledge, attitudes, and beliefs of the general public at scale.

Shatterproof relies on CBOs to foster relationships within the community and provide insight into the current state of addiction stigma in Kentucky. CBOs have invaluable ties to community members, and Shatterproof recognizes that CBOs are critical to the success of the campaign and ultimately, reducing stigma. Thus, Shatterproof's Program Coordinator (PC) will depend on CBOs' existing networks to endorse the campaign within the community and catalyze the impact.
